Christmas - Luke 2

Too often the words of traditional carols can lose their impact if we are not careful. The sentiment expressed in these incredible words is not to be missed. Underline or circle lyrics that are impactful to you.

This household hymn traces its origin back to 1847 when a French poet named Placide Cappeau de Roquemaure was asked to pen a poem for Christmas mass. Using the gospel of Luke as his inspiration, Placide quickly created the "Cantique de Noel" not knowing the amazing and unlikely story these words would tell over the next several years. "O Holy Night" became a song through the musical work of a Jewish man named Adolphe Charles Adams who brought the poem to life despite his differing religious views. It was brought to America by an abolitionist named John Sullivan Dwight who saw the words as proof that Christ came to free all men and in 1906 it was the first song ever sent through the air via radio waves thanks to a chemist by the name of Reginald Fessenden.

It is easy to highlight the fact that this song is now sung millions of times in churches in every corner of the world. What is important to highlight is what it can show us about the scripture that it was inspired by.

Like this song, the story of the birth of Jesus can also be overlooked due to its familiarity and notoriety. And similar to O Holy Night, where unlikely men and events led to the creation, popularity and message of this incredible song, the elements of Jesus' birth are in some ways ordinary and unexciting. Baby Jesus as savior seemed unlikely in light of Cesar's presence, the surroundings of his birth were humble, the circumstances were commonplace. Even the first recipients of the message were the most average Joe's you could have found in that culture.

And this is exactly the watermark of how God works. He takes the average and turns it into extraordinary, He takes the last and makes them first, He takes the unholy and makes it holy, He takes the overlooked and makes it the center of attention.

This insight into the story is what makes it so extraordinary and amazing. His faithfulness to work in spite of and through unlikely circumstances is a theme woven throughout history. How have you seen that in your life? How has God surprised you by using the ugly, common or overlooked facets of your life to work His will and tell His story? He is faithful. As we look at this story and our own, we will see His faithfulness show itself over and over again.

Luke 2:1-20

(AB) and on earth(AC) peace among those with whom he is pleased!"[c] 15When the angels went away from them into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us." 16And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby(AD) lying in a manger. 17And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. 18And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them. 19But(AE) Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart. 20And the shepherds returned,(AF) glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

This news caused the Mary and the Shepherds to praise God. Right now, what's your honest heart response to the birth narrative? In light of Mary and the shepherds response, what could your response be?
